The importance of beginnings

Genesis 1v1; Jeremiah 10v1-12; John 1v1-14

- Accurate directions don't work unless you have the right starting point.
- Genesis gives the foundation to make sense of the Bible, the gospel.
- ➤ When Paul was in Athens did the people initially understand his message? (See Acts 17v18, 20)

(1)Begin with God's words

- listen to God
- give God's explanation
- "Everything we know is knowledge that comes from God" True or false?
- ➤ "If you are asked why you believe (1 Peter 3v15) you should never defend your beliefs using the Bible." True or false?

(2) God has no beginning

- not idols
- not me
- not stuff
- ➤ If the universe was not made by the uncreated God then how plausible do you find the alternatives: (a) universe came from nothing, (b) universe has always been there?
- ➤ What is the difference between God and idols according to Jeremiah 10v11-12?
- ➤ Which came first: (a) person or (b) matter?

(3)Beginning of God's plan for creation

- creation of everything from nothing
- God who loves creation
- ➤ How does God identify himself in Jeremiah 33v2?
- \triangleright Isaiah 43v1-2: the God who creates is the God who r _ d _ _ ms [= saves].
 - ▶ Jesus, the Saviour, is the <u>same</u> uncreated God who creates in Genesis 1 [John 1v1]

Questions for discussion:

- 1. Was Francis Schaeffer right to say that when we are explaining the gospel we need to start with creation?
- 2. What do we learn about God in Genesis 1 that is different to the various ideas people have about God today?
- 3. Everyone has an explanation for where everything came from. How plausible are the different explanations? What practical difference for everyday life do the different explanations make?
- 4. How should you respond to knowing that God is your maker?
